A. Preparation

1. Visa

I took a Ryanair flight, I booked the tickets 3 weeks before, but I recommend to do it at least 28 days before departure because you can have a discount with your luggage.

3. My luggage

I took 20 kg + 10 kg. I bought the "Kipsta" bag from Décathlon that fit perfectly to the dimensions required by Ryanair.

B. Housing

1. Where to live

Housing in Bologna is very hard and expensive. I paid 715€ per month + a lot of agency fees for a really bad apartment with 6 flatmates. The location was really good (10 min from the university and everything was really close), but if you are not partying a lot, you can choose an accommodation outside the walls of Bologna and buy a bike.

2. Find a flat or a room

I found it on "Dovevivo", Italians will make everything possible to make you pay as much as possible, be prepared .

3. Cost

For the most lucky of you 550-600 \in for a room in a shared apartment, 900-1100 \in for a studio. I paid 715 \in for a very food located apartment.

III. When I arrive at the university

A. Inscription at the university

[Help: How was the process, what did you have to do?]

The process is easy before arriving at the university, everything is online. Once you are in Bologna, you have to check in and the process is really tricky, you have to connect to a platform during very specific times when all the other students want to check in at the same time. Hours are Tuesday and Thursday from 2 p.m. to 3 p.m. When you log in, there is a queue and if 3 p.m. passes, you have to start again next time. First come first served (Italy:)). I tried again 3 times before succeeding, which delayed the payment of my scholarship even further.

B. Information on the university

Class

Organizational behaviour: I recommend it to you. The first professor works on the board of directors of Ferrari and will take you inside the Ferrari factories, although no one is normally allowed to visit (only those who buy Ferraris). The course is quite easy, you can study only with the book but I recommend to attend the class to have the opportunity to make all the company visits.

Data science for policy analysis: I strongly recommend this course because it is really short and will give you time at the end of the semester to visit Italy. this course was really

interesting but was really targeted to students who did know a lot about microeconomics and the use of R. But the course ended at the beginning of April and the grade is based on a group project. I did not have a good understanding of R and microeconomics but managed to have a good grade because I was working with people who helped me. I learnt how to use R by myself (Using AI such as BlackBox and Chatgpt).

Statistics and Programming: DO NOT TAKE THIS COURSE. The notion that you'll learn has nothing to do with management or anything related to it. You'll not learn anything about programming and it will take you 8 hours per week just to do useless maths.

Market analysis and reporting: the course is given by an experienced consultant of the company "Promoteia". It is also only half the semester and the grade is based on a group presentation and a multiple choice questionnaire. It is very focusing on economical knowledge but I managed to have a good grade.

2. Organization of the Class

In Italy, you don't have to attend classes, but the teachers don't care if you understand their lessons or not. They rarely answer questions (with exceptions). The statistics course required a lot of personal work because I had 2 hours a day from Monday to Thursday. For the others, I studied 2 weeks before the exams and it went well, the pace of revision was not as fast as at Moma. Please note that you are required to have a minimum of 18/30 in all courses (i.e. 12/20) and that the grades do not offset each other. I think this destination is more suitable for people who want to specialize in finance for their master's degree.

3. List of courses and recommendation

Overall, the level in management courses is way easier in Italy. However, all the courses that requires a good level in maths are harder in my opinion.

DO NOT take the course of Industrial organization => nothing to do with industrial organization, it is just the continuation of the microeconomics course that the student from bologna had before.

4. Exam

As I said before, you are required to have a minimum of 18/30 in all courses without your grades being offset. The evaluation depends on the courses, but the organization is the same everywhere. When these courses last the entire semester, you have a mid-semester exam (which evaluates the knowledge learned so far), then a final exam (which evaluates the knowledge learned since the mid-semester exam) . If you have less than 18/30 in the

mid-semester part, you are obliged to retake a so-called "full exam" which evaluates the knowledge of the entire semester. You can choose not to take the mid-semester exams, in which case you will be obliged to take the "full exam". In all cases, you will have several chances to obtain the minimum required score (minimum 2 chances).

Statistics and programming: written exam (the programming part is only evaluated with 2 question at the end of the final exam)

Data science for policy analysis: group oral presentation and group project Market analysis and reporting: group oral presentation and MCQ Organizational behaviour: MCQ and optional group presentation

IV. When I life there

A. Safety

I went to the university by walking because I lived really close to it, I had the chance to do everything just by walking. You can buy a bike from previous Erasmus student, it is very common there to use bikes.

In my opinion, Rome is the most beautiful city in Italy. I visited Venice, Verona, Milan, Florence, Naples, Rome, Genova, and the Amalfi coast. Everything worth the visit and you can travel only for one day and come back to Bologna so it is very convenient. I also

went to Vienna in Austria as the Ryanair tickets were cheap and I loved this city, I recommend it. I also visited Albania and it was amazing (this country is really underrated). At some point if you travel a lot you will want to go to another country because even though each city in Italy has its own specificity, the visits will repeat themselves.
