However, the big advantage was that it was very close to the university, just a 15-minute walk away. I recommend looking for a place that's well-connected to both the university and the city center if possible.

# III. When I arrive at the university

## A. Inscription at the university

The process was pretty easy, you just have to complete the documents they send you. Everything is clearly explained, so there's no need to stress. There's always someone available to help if you encounter any issues, and most of the time, emails are answered within minutes, which is really reassuring.

## B. Information on the university

#### 1. Class

Each class is entirely shaped by the professor, so the experience can vary a lot. In some classes, attendance isn't mandatory, but your final grade depends entirely on the final exam. In others, professors encourage attendance by offering extra points, which is a nice incentive. I also noticed that oral presentations are a big part of the coursework, so it's important to be comfortable speaking in front of the class.

I would recommend most of the classes, but I suggest checking the teaching style of each professor if possible before choosing, to see what suits your learning style best

### 2. Organization of the Class

Classes typically last for 3 hours, with a 15-minute break halfway through. There's usually no homework, but you may be assigned presentations to prepare outside of class. Teachers generally emphasize autonomy, active participation, and speaking activities. If you're looking to improve your oral skills, this environment will be very helpful.

#### 3. Exam

Exams can take different formats: written, oral, or multiple-choice. They generally last around 2 hours. The grading scale is out of 30 with 18 being the minimum passing score.

## A. Safety

I personally felt quite safe, but I've heard from others that it's important to stay cautious. Pickpocketing is common, especially in the metro, so always keep an eye on your belongings. It's also a good idea to avoid dark or sketchy streets late at night. If possible, try not to walk alone at those times. As long as you stay aware and take basic precautions, you should be fine.

### B. Phone and Internet

A French phone number and internet connection will usually work fine for the first three months. After that period, you'll need to get an Italian phone number and data plan. I chose the company Iliad because it's quite affordable (10 euros per month) and offers flexible plans you can cancel at any time.

#### C. Events

You can follow the Erasmus Roma Instagram account, they regularly post updates about upcoming events and activities.

#### D. Sports

You can join a local gym by visiting in person and signing up for a membership. There are also sports activities organized through the Erasmus association like basketball.

## E. Eating

The food there is generally very good, and you can find delicious pasta at affordable prices. A great tip is to check TikTok, there are plenty of recommendations for good restaurants shared by locals and students.

## F. Go to the university: bus, car, bike

To get around by metro, tram, or bus, you have two options: you can either pay per trip; each ticket costs €1.30 and is valid for 90 minutes, or you can get a monthly unlimited transport card for around €30 at termini metro station.

#### G. Travels

I wouldn't recommend traveling alone as a woman, especially if you don't speak Italian, it can sometimes feel a bit overwhelming or unsafe in unfamiliar areas. It's always better to explore with friends or in a group

## H. Any other information you would have liked to know about

If I could go back in time, I would definitely take some Italian lessons before arriving. Most people aren't very comfortable speaking other languages, so knowing the basics and a few key phrases would have made everyday interactions much easier.
